Neighborhood Watch

Summer is almost here. Please keep in mind that along with the warm weather and fun activities, we also see a rise in criminal activity. Remember to call all suspicious activity to the police department's non-emergency number (385-5000). If the circumstance requires immediate police, fire or rescue response, do not hesitate to call 911. You are not bothering the police when you call. They would much rather respond and have it turn out to be nothing, than not be called when they are actually needed.

Our neighbors are our best security devices. Unfortunately, many people simply do not make an effort to know their neighbors. They are hesitant to report suspicious people or vehicles, fearing that they will be regarded as "snoopy."

Acknowledge your neighbors when you see them. Just a wave or a friendly hello will do. We needn't be close friends with our neighbors in order to look out for their interests. We can begin to build a better neighborhood watch security system by becoming acquainted with our neighbors and their everyday living patterns. By knowing when they are at work, on vacation, and so forth, we will be better able to judge whether a stranger should legitimately be at the neighbor's home. Inform your neighbors when you will be away and ask them to let you know when they will be gone. It is a win-win for everyone except would-be burglars.

A burglar's greatest fear is being observed. Each concerned neighbor is another pair of eyes to let the criminal know he is being watched. Neighborhood Watch supplies these eyes in our community. For the program to be totally effective, each resident must take an active role in both security improvement and observation.

You should:

- 1. Be alert to the things happening on your street.
- 2. Watch for the unusual.
- 3. Be alert. If you suspect anything out of the ordinary, call the non-emergency number (385-5000). The police department wants to know about all suspicious activity. If in doubt, call the police at 911. Don't wait until after crime strikes to call. The police want to prevent crime.
- 4. Know your neighbors.
- 5. Be alert to unfamiliar faces and their activities.
- 6. Make note of suspicious vehicles. Write down license numbers. Be accurate.
- 7. Make your home secure.
- 8. Involve your entire family, including adults and children, into the Neighborhood Watch Program.



Ask the Experts

Do you know that 1/8th inch of dust on your cooling coil will reduce your energy efficiency by ½? That's right, DOUBLE your cooling bill! HVAC system maintenance is important for your comfort, energy efficiency and health, and will extend the life of your heating and cooling system. Proper maintenance should include cleaning and flushing the AC coil, cleaning the air handler cabinet, and if necessary, cleaning the blower as well as the outside compressor and coils. This process will take on average 1.5 hours. The average cost for this type of service is \$149.00-\$179.00 and could save lots of money on your power bill.

The weather is heating up. Did you know the average air duct system looses 20% of the cooling through leaks into the attic or crawl space? The U.S. Dept. of Energy estimates on average duct leakage costs homeowners \$300.00 annually. If energy waste is not enough, leaking air ducts brings air into your home from the hot and dusty attic, or the damp dirty crawl space causing allergy conditions and dust and mold problems as well as odors in your home. Leaky air ducts can usually be fixed by the homeowner. With the cooling system running, move your hand along the exterior of the duct to find leaks. The best materials to seal are 100% silicone caulk or mastic duct sealant which can be found at your local hardware store. Duct tape will not hold for air duct leaks due to moisture, and/or hot temperatures.

How often should you have your air conditioning and duct systems cleaned? Your air conditioning system should be cleaned annually to maintain its operating efficiency, as well as to reduce strain on your system. Most system failures come from neglecting proper maintenance. Duct cleaning is suggested every 3-5 years depending on your lifestyle. For instance, families with children and pets should have these services more often. Always choose air duct or indoor air quality companies who possess an HVAC background and training. For instance, chimney sweep and carpet cleaning companies often perform duct cleaning services leaving behind damage to your air system due to lack of proper training. BE SAFE ON & AROUND THE WATER

From 1990 to 2000, drowning was the second leading cause of unintentional injury death among US children between 1 and 19 years of age. Age groups at greatest risk are toddlers and adolescent males.

Near-drowning events, in which victims survive for at least 24 hours, also result in significant numbers of injured children. It is estimated that for each drowning death, there are 1 to 4 nonfatal submersions serious enough to result in hospitalization. Children who still require cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) at the time they arrive at the emergency department have a poor prognosis, with at least half of survivors suffering significant neurologic impairment.

Supervision of young children around any water is an essential preventive strategy.

Drowning is the second-leading cause of injury-related death among children under the age of 15 (*U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention*).

Parents and caregivers need to be advised that they should never—even for a moment—leave children alone or in the care of another young child while in bathtubs, pools, spas, or wading pools or near irrigation ditches or other open standing water.

Parents should be certain that all people who will be caring for their child or children understand the need for constant supervision of children when in or around water.

You can greatly reduce the chances of you or your friends and family becoming drowning or near-drowning victims by following a few simple safety tips:

- **Keep an eye on friends and family**. Drowning can occur in as little as 20 seconds for children and 60 seconds for an adult. Drowning is known as the silent killer because most victims slip beneath the water without a sound. Paying close attention to those around you can drastically reduce such accidents.
- Learn to swim! The American Red Cross has swimming courses for people of any age and swimming ability.
- Never swim alone.

Most people drown within 10 to 30 feet of safety. Learn these few simple techniques to help someone in trouble and keep yourself safe.

Learn "Reach, Throw, Row, Don't Go!"

- Reach: To help someone in the water, reach first with a fishing pole, towel, boat oar, but don't get in the water yourself.
- Throw: Scan your area for items such as an empty milk jug, cooler, ring buoys that can be thrown to someone in the water.
- Row: It's not safe to go near a swimmer with the boat motor running. Use the oars to bring the boat close enough to reach or throw something to them.
- Don't Go: Without expert training and experience in lifesaving techniques, you could put yourself in danger along with the person you are trying to help.

<u>All boaters</u> in the state of Virginia are required to adhere to the following <u>carriage</u> regulations: at least one (1) USCG approved Type IV throwable (ring buoy or seat cushion), per boat, is required on all recreational boats regardless of size <u>(including paddle boats)</u>, in ADDITION to the wearable PFD (personal flotation device) required for each person on board.






